Who We Are

The Canadian Canoe Museum, established in Peterborough, Ontario, in 1997, is a unique national heritage centre that explores and celebrates the canoe's enduring significance to Canada. Founded on a collection of the late Professor Kirk Wipper that was over thirty years in the making, the Museum's holdings now number more than 600 canoes, kayaks and paddled watercraft. Together they span the country from coast to coast to coast and represent many of the major watercraft traditions of Canada. The Museum's artifacts range from the great dugouts of the First Nations of the Pacific northwest to the singular bark canoes of the Beothuk of Newfoundland; from the skin-on-frame kayaks of northern peoples from Baffin Island in the east to the Mackenzie River Delta in the northwest to the all-wood and canvas-covered watercraft manufactured by companies with names like Herald, Peterborough, Chestnut, Lakefield and Canadian. Through exhibits, stories, songs, workshops, classes and tours, the Museum shares this incomparable historic resource with the people of Canada and the world.

2011 Chair and Executive Director's Report

2011 was bittersweet, marked both by the impact of Kirk Wipper's passing and by the optimism generated by indications that the Museum has turned a corner on its way to a sustainable and robust future. Kirk Wipper's grand vision of the canoe as proxy for Canada is evident throughout The Canadian Canoe Museum, but his energy and optimism were with us day-to-day as well when he would bring people through for a personal tour, attend meetings and Museum events, or join Museum outings on the water. Kirk's presence will be sorely missed. Happily, Kirk's dream is part of the fabric of the Museum and his legacy lives on, even as the Museum has navigated through a flagging economy over the last couple of years. We're very pleased that this report details a positive financial position for the Museum at the close of 2011 which includes a number of significant capital expenditures.

The continuing challenge for the Museum will be to ensure that revenues exceed expenses. However, with new programs coming on-stream all the time, new budgeting, accounting and audit mechanisms in place, and with expanding fundraising capacity through our Gala Committee, Major Gifts Group, our new Development Coordinator and with the continued generosity of our many members, donors and friends, the Museum is positioned to meet and exceed its fundraising targets for 2012. This fiscal health will allow us to strive toward our two main goals: first, becoming the strongest and most vibrant organization we can be; and secondly, moving, eventually, to a new national hub and home on the water in Peterborough as called for in our Strategic Plan.

The "corner" the Museum turned in 2011 has to do with much internal re-building work that has been done over the last three years to strengthen the organization which has engendered the means and the confidence for the Museum to offer a fresh face to the world. New graphics on the outside of the Museum are emblematic of energized and renewed engagement with the city, the province, and the country. The Museum is reaching out locally, regionally and nationally through innovative new programs, through the website and through initiatives including a revitalized membership program, designed and built in 2011, that will be rolled out in the coming year.

That said, in the irrepressible spirit of Kirk Wipper, The Canadian Canoe Museum remains an important and exciting work in progress with a story to tell—with stories to tell—that is sustained, still, by the much-appreciated support of staff, volunteers, members and donors, as well as the Board, without which the Museum would not succeed.




A Legacy Honoured

If the canoes in the Museum could talk, they would speak of their makers and the people who paddled them through their storied pasts, but many of them would also echo the voice of Kirk Wipper, The Canadian Canoe Museum's founder and inspiration. In March 2011, Kirk "travelled on" at the age of 88. That inimitable baritone, that font of stories about where many of these canoes and kayaks came from and how they came into the collection—that voice and those stories can only be recalled now by those fortunate to have known him.

At a service in The Keene United Church, family and friends remembered Kirk. Museum Executive Director James Raffan began his remarks this way: "If you are in this church, then you would know that when you head North ... you eventually cross a line of magnetic uncertainty, a place where the compass needle tends to spin erratically. That's a little like how I have felt since 11:40 p.m. last Friday night when I learned that Kirk had died. Navigation since then has been difficult because one of the principal forces that trued my personal compass is gone. You may feel similarly adrift."

In early May the Museum hosted a celebration of Kirk's life and work. In a series of moving tributes, led by Kirk's daughter Joanna, his younger son David, and his wife Ann, people from all the many walks of Kirk's life filled the Museum with stories, songs, tears and laughter at the memorial service. Those present affirmed publicly to the assembly and privately to one another in fellowship and conversation before or after the service the indelible effect that "Captain Kirk" had on individuals, on canoeing and camping organizations and, of course, on his most significant and lasting legacy on earth, The Canadian Canoe Museum. The Museum is preparing an exhibit that will celebrate the life of the founder and the story of how one man amassed a collection of canoes that tell a unique story of Canada. We hope that Kirk's credo "To know, to care, to act" will stay central in all our hearts as we remember his laugh, his commitment and his passion and work to keep his memory and his legacy alive.

Audiences Served

Students

In 2011, 4,683 students participated in the Museum's school-age educational programs. 340 of those spent a memorable night in the Museum and 50 of them learned to paddle a canoe. The students came from 101 schools and 19 non-school organizations.

Here are just a few of their comments:

In the course of the Museum's 2011 Artisan Workshops, 66 students spent 792 hours engaging with history at the Museum. Some Wednesday afternoons are quite quiet - others are not so. I welcomed them to international day, suggesting they were in good company.

Needless to say I was thrilled to have welcomed all these visitors to our beloved Museum and from their comments in the Guest Book they were thrilled with their visit — the young woman from the Netherlands said, "Great Museum" the Aussie remarked, "Very well done. And of course, he wanted to see that canoe. Dave was able to link him up with Nancy and Scott and the three carried on an animated discussion about coincidences and canoes. Two girls from Ludwigsburg in Germany also crossed Deac's path and there was a long dialogue in German among the three of them, as he bhad the rudiments of the language. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of the summary financial statements based on the audited financial statements of The Canadian Canoe Museum for the year ended December 31, 2011.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summary financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standard (CAS) 810, "Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements".

Opinion

In our opinion, the summary financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of The Canadian Canoe Museum for the year ended December 31, 2011 are a fair summary of those financial statements. However, the summary financial statements are qualified to the equivalent extent as the audited financial statements of The Canadian Canoe Museum for the year ended December 31, 2011.

The qualification of the audited financial statements is described in our qualified audit opinion in our report dated March 26, 2012. Our qualified audit opinion is based on the fact that we were unable to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of certain revenues. Our qualified audit opinion states that, except for the effects of the described matter, those financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Federation as at December 31, 2011, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.



Fundraising

Under the leadership of Committee Chair Jim Stewart, the Major Gifts Committee raised \$85,600 for critical projects such as the completion of the new exterior graphics, the annual special exhibit, canoe tripping and teaching equipment for the education programs and an in-house exhibit development studio to name just a few.

The Board, Staff and Volunteers of the Museum are grateful to the more than 500 donors and supporters who made contributions to the Museum this year. The Annual Appeal and generous Legacy Fund gifts in honour of founder Kirk Wipper represented more than \$57,000 in revenue.

The Museum was the recipient of a two-year grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to hire a Development Coordinator. This is a significant opportunity to build fundraising capacity and engage with supporters across the country on a scale befitting our goal of becoming a national institution.

History Preserved

Walter Walker Exhibit

Before his death in 2009 at the age of 101, renowned Lakefield canoe builder Walter Walker made it known that he would like his tools and canoe-building equipment to be given to The Canadian Canoe Museum after his death. In honour of Walter's remarkable 70+ year career in this trade the Museum created a special exhibit entitled Walter Walker: A Life in Canoes. One of highlights is a re-creation of the basement workshop where Walter continued to build canoes for so many years after his nominal retirement. When the special exhibit closes in the spring of 2012, sections of this exhibit will be re-installed outside the Museum's new Living Tradition Workshop, which has been established in Walter Walker's honour.

Exhibit Studio Established

With the generous financial support of George Dembroski, the Museum created an in-house exhibit design studio. Featuring state-of-the-art equipment for design and large-format printing and mounting, this new facility will enable staff to produce exhibit and graphic panels right at the Museum.

Communities Engaged

For the latest installation in its decade-long progress around the country, the Museum's travelling exhibit *The Canoe: a Canadian Cultural Icon* was hosted by Fort Calgary this year and several Museum staff travelled west in conjunction with the show. Executive Director James Raffan flew out to speak at the opening, General Manager John Summers later provided a talk for its members and volunteers and Curator Jeremy Ward worked with its staff on the installation of the exhibit, returning again to strike it for the return journey in the fall.

Three canoes from the Museum's collection were loaned to the Design Exchange in Toronto for an exhibit entitled *Play Nation: Canada's Outdoor Culture*, which was on display from July to October. The exhibit was complemented by an October presentation by General Manager John Summers, entitled "A Thing Properly Designed and Made: Some Thoughts About the Construction of Canoes".

After 14 years of safe storage while it awaited a suitable home, The Canadian Canoe Museum returned the "Odeyak" to northern Quebec. This unusual vessel, part James Bay hunting canoe, part kayak, was developed to raise awareness of hydroelectric developments in Northern Quebec and crewed by Cree and Inuit delegates who paddled into New York to bring attention to the plight of Quebec's northern population. The Odeyak continues to be an important political symbol 21 years later. This canoe will displayed in the remarkable new cultural institute in the Cree community of Oujé-Bougoumou, set to open in 2012.

Thanks to a fundraising effort led by Past Chair Jim Stewart, the support of many donors, the design talents of Michael Edwards, who donated his services, and the hard work of Museum volunteers who did the installation, the Museum now presents a much better face to the world following the completion of the Curb Appeal project.
