THE JOURNEY CONTINUES

In our last annual report, we expressed hope that after such a challenging year of the pandemic and pivots, 2021 would bring calmer waters. Despite having to continue persevering through the pandemic, we experienced many exciting moments and milestones, although much of it occurred behind the scenes and online.

From hosting a virtual author's talk with James Raffan to offering virtual tours for seniors in local retirement and long-term care facilities, creating two 360-degree virtual tours of the Museum and Collection Centre, and hosting a tour of the collection with our Curator, there were many ways to experience the Museum from anywhere in the world. We also connected with almost 1400 students across Canada through our live virtual field trips!

By mid-summer, we welcomed visitors back and having locals, tourists, and families exploring the galleries again was a welcome return to (almost) normal.

The new museum project kept us busy, especially during the stay-at-home orders. The Collections team continued caring for the collection and began preparing each canoe for moving. As part of the exhibit development process, the Exhibit Design team interviewed more than 25 elders, knowledge holders, language speakers, canoe builders and paddlers. The team also selected the watercraft for the new exhibits and continued to work on the main content of the seven exhibit zones. Two Exhibit Design team members also had the opportunity to travel to Haida Gwaii to strengthen relationships related to Victor Adams' Eagle Canoe, commissioned by Kirk Wipper in 1971.

We also had the opportunity to celebrate two significant milestones for the new museum.

It is a major success to be able to celebrate the beginning of construction on our new site, with a new design and architect, less than a year after pivoting. It was incredibly special to gather together with everyone who has made this new museum project possible - project donors, funders, partners, members, Elders, knowledge holders, and community members.

We were also excited to launch our public fundraising campaign, *Move the Collection*. On this "final portage" to the water's edge, we are inviting Canadians from coast to coast to coast to support the move of our 600+ canoes, kayaks, and paddled watercraft, as well as countless small artifacts and archives, which is no small feat.

We began the year with our doors closed due to the pandemic and celebrating the purchase of our new Ashburnham property. The year ended with construction beginning on the new museum. We are grateful that you have been pulling with us throughout these swells. Thank you for continuing with us on this journey!

TREASURER'S REPORT

Following the ups and downs of the previous year, the Museum entered 2021 with determination and new resolve. Despite closing our doors or restricting the number of visitors for much of the year to protect both public and staff, museum operations continued with minimal losses. This was made possible through the continued support of our donors, funders, and partners, along with \$570,000 of government assistance related to COVID-19 recovery.

On the new museum front, our team worked to secure, purchase, and begin construction on the Johnson Property throughout the year. Significant funding has been secured through all four levels of government, of which \$3.6 million was received in 2021. In addition, we received a total of \$5.2 million during the year thanks to our ongoing relationship with the Weston Family Foundation and the many donors listed in this report – for which we could not be more grateful.

The most significant development has been the beginning of construction in October 2021. \$3 million worth of construction work was completed by the end of 2021, and more is to come. Our current year excess of revenues over expenses of \$7.5 million will be used to directly pay for the continued construction of the building and exhibits, along with the landscaping and administrative costs.

Exhibits Development and Collaborative Relations

Every canoe has a story to tell. These vessels serve as a lens to understand the world, reminding us that we are all connected by water. The Canadian Canoe Museum aims to share these stories in new and engaging ways as we work to develop a full suite of new exhibits in six thematic zones in which visitors will engage with stories from across the country and around the world. Learn about design and ingenuity, how watercraft connect us to water, to ourselves and to each other.

Early in the exhibit development process, The Canadian Canoe Museum committed to a target of parity of Indigenous and non-Indigenous content, voice and perspectives throughout the new exhibition, and a balanced representation of geographical regions, cultures, and gender. This commitment in 2020 led to a year of tapping into existing and starting new relationships across the country with a diverse group of people who have their own stories to tell.

Collaborative relationships with community coordinators, cultural leaders, canoe and kayak makers, industry professionals, subject experts and paddlers from many different walks of life are feeding stories and content into our new exhibitions. Using first-person voice allows people to tell their stories about specific watercraft and their contexts.

Curatorial and Collections

The Museum's collection is at the heart of everything we do. In July, we began cleaning, photographing, documenting, and packing each canoe and kayak for transfer to our new Class A facility. We finalized the custom cradle design, which will support each canoe and kayak moving into our Collection Hall and protect them during the move to our new facility. By the end of 2021, more than 200 canoes were cleaned and ready for their custom cradle.

We packed our archival holdings and a portion of our small artifacts throughout the winter months, and the boxing of our reference library began thanks to volunteer support.

To help prepare the canoes for their upcoming move, Elders from local First Nations acknowledged the canoes' living spirits while performing traditional care on the collection.

NEW MUSEUM RENDERINGS

A Design Inspired by the Canoe

The new museum's architecture is inspired by craftsmanship, and the use of natural elements reflects a connection to the land and the artisanship of canoe making. The new home for the collection will be as innovative as the canoe itself and will play a vital role in the stewardship of this national cultural asset. Assisting the Museum with the realization of a creative vision for our waterfront campus is the award-winning architectural firm, Lett Architects Inc. (Peterborough, ON).

CAMPAIGN UPDATE

The Canadian Canoe Museum is on a \$40 million journey to build a new home for the collection on the shores of Little Lake in Peterborough.

A mix of private leadership donors, government partners, and the public will fund the new museum. As we join together from coast to coast to coast, collectively as one, we will ensure this nationally significant collection is protected and a fundamental part of Canadian heritage is not lost.

With a location and design secured, our team revised and secured funding agreements for the new project, continued stakeholder engagement and donor stewardship, built new relations, and sought funding through all available channels. We are grateful for our donors' and partners' patience, unending support, and enthusiasm for our new vision at Little Lake.

THE \$40M CAMPAIGN JOURNEY



Public Phase: Move the Collection

In November, with excitement building for the new museum, we launched the public phase of our fundraising campaign, inviting Canadians to join us on our portage to the water's edge!

What does it take to move more than 600 watercraft and 500 paddles, along with hundreds of artifacts and an entire archive and library collection? It takes a community!

To prepare for this move, each vessel needs to be cleaned, photographed, documented, tagged, fitted for a custom-built pallet for transportation and storage, and then quarantined before the Collections and Curatorial team can install it in the new museum.

By supporting the move of a canoe, kayak, or paddle, you are not just moving an artifact; you are preserving its stories and ensuring that the knowledge it holds will be shared for generations to come.
